


NARRATIVE

The total number of injuries is down by 9% compared to the same period last year and is set to meet the annual target set.

There has been an increase in RIDDOR reportable accidents. The main reason for this relates to slips and trips as there have been five slip and trip RIDDOR accidents for quarters 1 and 2 of 2011, compared to nil for quarters 1 and 2 of 2010. This does not relate to any particular activity (one at a fire, two involving uniformed activity on station, one involving non uniformed activity and one involving physical training). The SHE Team will continue to promote slip and trip awareness as these remain the number one cause of WMFS accidents.

The numbers of near hit reports are down – the SHE Team have recently released promotional material to try and increase reporting levels.

The numbers of violence near hits are down, although 2 injuries (one major) have been reported this year at incidents, compared to none last year.

The numbers of road traffic collisions reported for quarters 1 and 2 of 2011 is the same (79) as quarters 1 and 2 of 2010.
